





### **Maximizing Instructional Minutes**

- Conscientiously select literature
- Student-driven, project-based learning across the curriculum
- Leadership as the underlying "subject" (all academic areas)—connect it all to leadership
- Discussion prompts—lunch line, classroom transitions



- Standardized testing atmosphere
- Second-shift settings
- Disciplinary settings (i.e., detention)
- Captain & coach leadership training
- Club leadership training
- Advisor assignments/training



• "Do" Leadership differently, e.g., modify selection-only opportunities; conduct leadership development during detention

- Leadership book club (LA)
- Leadership workshops—all subs
- Leadership club (student-driven)
